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Committee Report

The Management Committee presents its report for the period ended 30 June 2025.

Principal activities and review of the year.

The Union's principal activity during the year continued to be that of governing body of Rugby Football Union in Surrey.

Introduction

It has been a year of recovery, growth, and opportunity – one in which we have continued to build on our strong foundations, overcome ongoing challenges, and look with confidence toward the future of rugby in our county.

Community & Participation

Surrey Rugby remains committed to being an inclusive, welcoming and vibrant community. This season saw a positive resurgence in registered player numbers across many age groups and sections.

Mini and Junior rugby continues to thrive, with particular growth in U12-U15 age groups.

Our Age Grade team, led by Jools Goringe - and supported by Pendy Patel, Matt Pickin and Darrell Spencer - has driven real momentum in Age Grade rugby. Player and team numbers have grown and we have seen more playing opportunities made available across the county.

Women and Girls rugby continues to be an area of focus and growth. The expansion of the Girls playing offer and the supporting of clubs to cluster has grown the offering. This is a testament to the commitment and strategic investment Surrey has made in recent years. Our goal remains to ensure equal opportunity, visibility, and support across all sections.

Competitions, Regulations & Club Engagement

Despite weather-related disruptions earlier in the year, our domestic leagues ran smoothly with strong participation. Congratulations to all league and cup winners and thanks to our dedicated League Secretaries, Referees and Competition Managers.

A major development this season was the RFU's nationwide rollout of the new player registration system. Surrey clubs responded proactively and professionally, with high compliance levels and clear communication to players and Team Managers. This system now provides a much clearer picture of player participation and movement, which will help inform future planning and governance.

Representative Rugby

We had a successful Youth Representative Programme, with over 100 boys and girls taking part as part of Surrey's Development Player Pathway. Each age band benefited from high-quality coaching and three representative fixtures against neighbouring counties.

We were proud to see four Surrey U18 boys and three U20 players selected for Divisional representation, showing the calibre of our talent and coaching setup.

At Senior level, it was a challenging season in terms of results, with just one win for the Men's team. That said, the young profile of both the Men's and Women's squads gives us optimism for the future. We thank the coaching and support teams for their continued hard work and commitment.

We also continue to maintain strong links with Harlequins Academy and will be looking to deepen partnerships with local universities to further support player development and retention.

Coaching, Refereeing & Player Welfare

This year we ran over 15 coaching workshops, attended by more than 500 coaches across the county. These sessions, focused on both technical development and values-led coaching, have helped raise standards and energise our coaching community.

Refereeing also saw excellent progress. Over 200 new officials completed either the RFU referee accreditation or took part in the Society's "Take Up the Whistle" course. For a second consecutive season, young referees proudly officiated at the Quins Cup Finals at the Twickenham Stoop, a reflection of their maturity, confidence and the quality of support they receive through Surrey Rugby and the Society.

To support player safety, we distributed over 100 First Aid vouchers to clubs. In areas with lower numbers, we worked collaboratively by clustering clubs to ensure every match met minimum pitch-side medical cover requirements — a core part of our RugbySafe commitment.

Club Engagement & Communication

Effective communication with our clubs has remained a core focus. There has been close work this season with our two elected Surrey RFU Council Members, Paula Carter and John Crate, meeting regularly, alongside members of the Executive, to discuss key priorities and ensure strong communication and engagement with our member clubs. This collaborative approach has helped keep clubs informed and involved, and we will continue this next season through regular newsletters, Zoom calls, and club visits.

These forums have allowed us to listen more closely, share best practice and support clubs in real time as they respond to local challenges.

Governance, Strategy & Development

This season has been marked by both progress and transition.

Sadly, we lost our serving President, John Pownall, to illness. John's passing is deeply felt across the Surrey Rugby community. He will be sorely missed after more than 10 years of service in a number of significant roles, including Club Development Chair, Honorary Secretary and County Chair. His leadership, kindness and unwavering dedication to community rugby leave a lasting legacy.

This year also saw the successful launch of our Strategic Priorities and the Six Pillars of Support, which provide clear direction and practical assistance for clubs. These will continue to be key areas of focus into 2025–2026.

Finance & Sponsorship

Our financial position remains stable, with continued investment into key programmes, volunteer recognition, medical, facilities and Coach and Referee development.

On the financial side, the operating deficit of £7,267 (2024 Deficit £8,340) was eminently manageable. It should be noted here that the magnificent support of all our sponsors, totaling nearly £49k, helped with this, but we were largely able to rely on the financial reserves of the CB to ensure ultimate stability.

Our overall strategy is to operate with a small deficit each year. This enables us to ensure that the financial position is stable while maximising the spend on developing rugby in Surrey.

The balance sheet continues to show a liquid position with cash and listed securities of just over £259k, and the overall financial wellbeing of the Union is considered to be sound.

We are grateful for the ongoing support of our sponsors and commercial partners and are actively pursuing new relationships that align with our community values.

Conclusion

This has been a season of great teamwork, progress and shared achievement, and the Surrey Rugby Board would like to thank every player, coach, referee, volunteer, club officer, and supporter who has contributed to our game.

Accountants Report to the Management Committee of Surrey County Rugby Football Union Ltd

We have performed certain procedures in respect of the company's unaudited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2025 on pages two to ten, made enquiries of the company's officers and assessed accounting policies adopted by the officers, in order to gather sufficient evidence for our conclusion in this report.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and the company's officers for our work, for this report or the conclusions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities

You have confirmed that you have met your duty as set out in the Management committees responsibilities statement on page one. You consider that the company is exempt from the statutory requirement for an audit for the year. Our responsibility is to form and express an independent conclusion, based on the work carried out, to you on the financial statements.

Scope

We conducted our engagement in accordance with the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England & Wales Interim Technical Release AAF 03/06. Our work was based primarily upon enquiry, analytical procedures and assessing accounting policies in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015). If we considered it to be necessary, we also performed limited examination of evidence relevant to certain balances and disclosures in the financial statements where we became aware of matters that might indicate a risk of material misstatement in the financial statements.

The terms of our engagement exclude any requirement to carry out a comprehensive assessment of the risks of material misstatement, a consideration of fraud, laws, regulations or internal controls, and we have not done so. We are not required to, and we do not, express an audit opinion on these financial statements.

Conclusion

Based on our work, nothing has come to our attention to refute the officers confirmation that the accounts comply with the Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014.
